2008 Young Musicians Scholarship Competition Saturday, February 2

On Saturday, 50 students will come to First Presbyterian Church in Rochester for the Rochester Music Guild's 2008 Young Musicians Scholarship Competition. The 44th annual competition, which this year has been reorganized and moved to a new venue, is an opportunity for talented area musicians in grades 8 through 12 to compete for scholarships totalling nearly \$5000 in four divisions:

Carter Douglas Memorial PIANO Master Class Division
Georgia Daniel Memorial STRINGS Division
Sally Duffy Memorial VOICE Division
Carl Schroedel Memorial WINDS Division

The four divisions are named for noted Rochester musicians who spent much of their lives involved in music – performing, teaching, and promoting music and the arts in our community.



Carter Douglas was a gifted young pianist whose developing talent touched many in our community in her short life.



Georgia Daniel worked for over 22 years in the Rochester Public Schools, teaching students and directing school orchestras.



Sally Duffy, a two-time President of the Rochester Music Guild, sang with the Rochester Symphony Orchestra Chorale and had a passion for music and the arts.



Carl Schroedel, who served on both the Rochester Music Guild Board and the Rochester Orchestra and Chorale Board, was a performer himself as well as a dedicated supporter of the arts.

The scholarships are funded from memorial funds established in their names, from Rochester Music Guild monies, and from the Judy and Jim Sloan Foundation.

In this year's competition, we are pleased to have four very distinguished judges:

Kent McWilliams - Associate Professor of Music at St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minnesota.

An award winner at competitions in Canada and Portugal, McWilliams has enjoyed a successful performing career, having performed in over a dozen countries. Currently, McWilliams performs and records chamber music as a member of the Meridian Trio and conducts performance and pedagogy workshops across North America. The Guild will be utilizing his teaching skills in the piano division's new master class format as he will work with each student following his or her performance in an open audition setting.

Celine Leathead - First violinist in the Minnesota Orchestra and faculty member at the Fine Arts Interdisciplinary Resource School in Crystal, Minnesota.

A native of Montreal, Canada, Ms. Leathead has performed chamber works by Beethoven, Dvorák and Mozart at Sommerfest concerts, and played the Brahms Piano Quintet with Emanuel Ax in 1996. Before joining the Minnesota Orchestra in 1994, she was a member of the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra and associate concertmaster of the Alabama Symphony.

Mary Martz - Instructor in Music at St. Olaf College.

Ms. Martz has an extensive performance background in opera theatre with the Minnesota Opera, Minnesota Opera Touring Company, other regional companies, oratorio, recitals, and many years of classroom and private voice instruction.

Dana Maeda - Instructor in Music at St. Olaf College.

Ms. Maeda performs with our own Rochester Symphony Orchestra as well as the Dolce Wind Quintet and WindWorks Woodwind Quintet. She is active as a free-lance performer in the Twin Cities area and has previously served on the faculty of Bethel University and Crown College.

This was the 12th annual event for this program, which is designed to help students experience the feel and sounds of musical instruments through mini-music lessons. Professional musicians were on hand with instruments such as brass, woodwinds, strings, and percussion.

Tom Miller, our RSOC contact person for the event, commented "almost 350 kids took an average of over 6 lessons each, and 2200 lessons in a single day is a LOT of educational opportunity for the musicians of tomorrow. This would not have happened without the excellent help from the members of the Guild. We are most grateful for that."

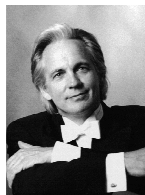

Better the second time around?



Jackie James first came onto the Rochester Music Guild board as Scholarship Chair back in the early '80s, during the exciting time when Jere Lantz first came to Rochester. Last year, after a 25-year hiatus, she returned to the board as Scholarship Co-Chair with Chris Parisi. Jackie and Chris have reorganized the scholarship awards (see their article on page 3) and moved the competition and

recital to a new venue this year -- First Presbyterian Church in downtown Rochester.

Jackie and Chris met some years ago when their children were active together in musical activities for Rochester youth. They have remained friends over the years, and teaming up as scholarship co-chairs in the fall of 2006 seemed a natural thing to do.

Jackie grew up in Wilmette, IL, one of Chicago's northern suburbs. She came to Minnesota to attend St. Olaf College in Northfield where she completed her nursing degree.
